Code Enforcement

Help beautify Blanchard! It is a violation of the Municipal Code of any of the following:

- * Allow the accumulation of trash and/or debris and our junk on your property.
- * Allow tall weeds or grass (including edges along the street and sidewalk) to exceed 12-inches or higher.
- * Accumulation of inoperable and/or junk vehicles and parts on your property.
- * Parking of trailers, boats, and RVs in alleyways or in front of the building line.
- * Allowing tree limbs over hang the street with less than 8-foot clearance.
- * Failure to trim trees, grass and weeds in alleys or between sidewalk and pavement.
- * Leaving grass in the street after mowing.
- * Watering lawn every day or out of odd/even sequence.

Shop Local

Here's what happens when you "shop local."

- 1. For every \$100 you spend at locally owned businesses, \$68 stays in Blanchard. What happens when you spend that same \$100 at a national chain? Only \$43 stays in the community.
- 2. You wouldn't want your house to look like everyone else's in the U.S. So why would you want your community to look that way?
- 3 Local businesses are better at creating higherpaying jobs for your neighbors. When you shop locally, you help create jobs for firemen, police officers, and many other essential professions.
- 4. Buying from a locally owned business conserves energy and resources in the form of less fuel for transportation and less packaging.
- 5. Local business owners know you, and you know them. Studies have shown that local businesses donate to community causes at more than twice the rate of chains.
- 6. Shopping in a local business district means less infrastructure, less maintenance, and more money available to beautify the community. Also, spending locally instead of online ensures that your sales taxes are reinvested where they belong in Blanchard.

Thanksgiving

Our modern Turkey Day has its origins in two very different holidays; the harvest home feast and the formal day of thanksgiving proclaimed by church or government authorities in gratitude for a particular event, such as a military victory.

Very few days of thanksgiving coincided with harvest celebrations. Thanksgiving Day began in Plymouth Colony in 1621, when the Pilgrims gave thanks for their survival and crops.

In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln set aside the last Thursday in November for a national celebration of Thanksgiving Day. (In 1941, the U.S. Congress decreed that Thanksgiving shall fall on the fourth Thursday of November).

Roast turkey, stuffing, cranberry sauce, vegetables, and pumpkin pie were the main dishes of the New England harvest home feast and became popular because of their supposed connection to the Pilgrims.

Water Rationing

The City of Blanchard reminds citizens that the City receives 100% of our water from the City of Oklahoma City. As a result, we maintain a year-round, mandatory odd/even lawn watering schedule to facilitate the conservation of its ground water supply from OKC.

Addresses ending in an even number such as the 2^{nd} , 4^{th} , 6^{th} , 8^{th} , 10^{th} , 12^{th} , 14^{th} , 16^{th} , 18^{th} , 20^{th} , 22^{nd} , 24^{th} , 26^{th} , 28^{th} , and 30^{th} may water on even-numbered days of the month.

If your address ends in an odd number, then you can legally water on the 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, 11th, 13th, 15th, 17th, 19th, 21st,

23rd, 25th, 27th, 29th, and 31st of each month.

The City also encourages citizens to water before 10 a.m. and after 7 p.m. throughout the year.

Weatherization Assistance

PSO offers to its customers a 'Home Weatherization Assistance Program'.

Homeowners and renters with an annual household income of \$55,000 or less in a home less than 2,200 square feet and built prior to 2010 may be eligible for FREE home upgrades such as attic insulation, air and duct sealing, and more.

PSO's service provider, Titan ES, will perform an energy assessment at your home. If your home qualifies, Titan will schedule and complete the necessary home upgrades.

The services are completed at NO cost to you. PSO pays Titan ES for any approved upgrades completed on you home.

Winter Begins

The winter solstice is one of the two times each year that the Sun is at its farthest point from the equator and appears to stand still. It occurs on Saturday, December 21st at 3:20 a.m. CST.

The word solstice is derived from the Latin sol, or "Sun," and stitium, or "stoppage." The Halcyon Days also occur around this time. According to ancient legend, a grieving wife named Alcyone, or Halcyon, threw herself into the sea upon discovering the drowned body of her beloved husband, Ceyx. The gods took pity on the pair, transforming them into kingfishers with the power to still the stormy seas for 14 days around the time of the winter solstice while they built their nest and hatched their young.
